## American Legion Massillon Post 221 Annual Robert Haas Memorial Scholarship

(Named in memory of General Robert Haas, long time member and friend of Post 221 and other veterans organizations)

- 1. Massillon American Legion Post 221 will offer a maximum of two (2) \$2500.00 Scholarships in 2024. This is a \$1000.00 increase from last year.
- 2. Applications will be available March 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024, and may be picked up at the Post 221 tavern or downloaded from the Post web site.
- 3. Eligibility: Scholarship recipients must be the natural, legally adopted child, step child or grandchild of a member in good standing of Massillon American Legion Post 221, or the Sons of the American Legion Squadron 221. Member in good standing includes a deceased parent or grandparent who was a member in good standing at the time of his or her death. Applicants must have completed at least their junior year in high school.
- 4. The scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis, and the recipients will be chosen by a Scholarship Committee appointed by the Post Commander.
- 5. The committee will consider academic achievement, character and service in the selection of the recipients.
- 6. Applications that are incomplete, do not conform to directions or are received after the deadline will NOT be considered.
- 7. The decision of the selection committee is final, and not subject to appeal.
- 8. Completed applications must be received by the Post no later than April 19th, 2024.

Robert D. Haas was born March 9, 1928, and graduated from Strasburg High in 1946. On June 12, 1946, he raised his hand to serve his county in the United States Army. He was assigned to a detachment of high-frequency radio transmission station from the Pentagon to Fort Monroe, VA.

After this enlistment, he attended the University of Akron and enrolled in the ROTC program. He graduated in 1951 with a Bachelor of Science in Education and was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the US Army. On December 2, 1951, he was called from inactive duty to active duty and was deployed to Korea where he commanded a 60-man infantry platoon on the Main Line of Resistance. On July 6, 1953, he was honorably discharged with the rank of 1st Lieutenant and awarded the National Defense Service Medal; Korean Service Medal (with 1 Bronze Service Star); United Nations Korean Service Medal; Republic of Korea War Service Medal; Bronze Star and Combat Infantryman's Badge.

On January 1, 1957, he joined the US Army Reserves, serving as commander of the 308th Engineer Battalion. In 1966 he was promoted to Major, where he served as Liaison Officer at West Point Military Academy. One of his biggest thrills came when three Massillon boys were admitted to the academy in the same year. In 1975 he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel. In 1979 (due to age restrictions) he retired Regular Army and USAR.

Not being one to rest after retirement, in 1983 he joined the Ohio Military Reserves. The State of Ohio Adjutant General's Department appointed him Commander (OHMR) on September 23, 1993. On January 29, 1996, Bob received an Honorable Retirement from the Ohio Military Reserve at the rank of Major General.

After returning to the civilian sector in 1954, he took on the adventure of a 7th grade teacher and coach with the Strasburg Schools. Shortly thereafter, he began teaching Algebra in Massillon at Jones Junior High School and coached Football, Basketball, and Track. In 1959, he was hired as Principal for Whittier School. He would gather students and staff at the flagpole in the mornings before school to render respect to our county and lead them in the Pledge of Allegiance. Teaching was a labor of love for Bob.

He cared about the well-being of his students and athletes. They knew they could go to him with problems or concerns, and he would listen and counsel or lend a helping hand. In 1974 he was promoted to the position of Assistant Superintendent of Massillon City Schools where he served until 1985.

Bob was very involved in the community and one of his proudest moments was when he assisted Mayor Catazaro-Perry in helping Massillon become a Purple Heart City. He served ten years on the Board of Directors for the Stark County Veterans Service Commission, where he passionately served with dedication to the veterans and their families until his retirement on January 14, 2018.

Bob led his life and taught his family by example to have integrity, to work hard, and to be optimistic, to give back, and to be grateful for all blessings.

Two very proud highlights in his military career were his induction into the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame, and his invitation as one of 12 military and Korean Veterans to attend the 50th Anniversary of the Korean War in Korea.

Bob was a long time and very valued member of American Legion Post 221 as well as other local veteran groups. He was extremely active in service to fellow veterans, and respected by all he came into contact with. Those of us who had the honor to know him will always miss him.
